Argentina. *80th anniversary of Asociación Argentina de Dermatología.* The Asociación Argentina de Dermatología was founded 80 years ago in 1907, making it one of the oldest dermatological societies in the world. To celebrate this anniversary, an international meeting will be held 14–17 October 1987 in Iguazú National Park, where the world-famous falls are situated. Members of the dermatological community and their families are invited. The scientific program is outstanding, and there will also be a program of social events and activities. China. *National conference on MDT of leprosy held in Cheng-du.* For the purpose of spreading multidrug therapy (MDT) of leprosy to the whole country, a national conference was held in Cheng-du under the auspices of the Ministry of Public Health last December. Leprologists from experimental units reported their experiences in fieldwork of MDT of leprosy. The preliminary results revealed that the therapeutic effect of MDT recommended by WHO was satisfactory for multibacillary leprosy and clofazimine was acceptable by most Chinese leprosy patients despite the skin discoloration, especially in the rural areas. Dr. Ma Haide, Advisor to the Ministry of Public Health, appealed to the leprologists to spread MDT to all leprosy patients in the whole country as soon as possible in order to eliminate leprosy in the main by the end of this century. A manual for MDT of leprosy will be edited and published by the Minister of Health, and training courses on MDT of leprosy will be held at various levels in this country in 1987.—Prof. Ye Gan-yun.

Germany. *Foundation of the Hansen Institute, Würzburg.* The Germany Leprosy Relief Association in cooperation with the Missionsärztliche Institut, both of Würzburg, announce the foundation of the Hansen Institute. The Institute was to begin work at the end of 1986 in the following areas: a) supervision of the introduction of multiple drug therapy in the context of world leprosy control; b) the foundation of a demonstration laboratory with simple equipment and techniques suitable for Third World conditions; and c) information on leprosy.

India. *Bombay Acworth Seminars 1985–1986.* The Acworth Leprosy Hospital Society for Research, Rehabilitation and Education in Leprosy in Bombay recently celebrated its 15th anniversary. The following seminars were held over the year:

a) The Role of Phenolic Glycolipid-I in Leprosy, 31 October 1985. This seminar was moderated by Dr. P. R. Mahadevan, and consisted of three presentations dealing with the significance of this material, its origins from *M. leprae* and infected tissues, and the serodiagnosis of leprosy using phenolic glycolipid-I in ELISAs.

b) Experience in Rehabilitation of Leprosy Patients Pertaining to Bombay City, 20 December 1985. The chairperson of this seminar was Dr. R. Ganapati. The recommendations of the seminar included suggestions that regularity of treatment rather than bacteriological negativity should be considered in making patients eligible for vocational training. Noninfectious leprosy patients should not be debarred from employment. Health education is needed for the success of rehabilitation programs in leprosy.

c) Experience in Control of Leprosy and Tuberculosis in an Urban Area, 27

February 1986. The moderator of this workshop was Dr. K. V. Desikan. The program dealt with the pathogenicity of mycobacteria, and the chemotherapy, epidemiology, methods of case detection, and difficulties in control programs for both diseases.

d) Workshop on Leprous Neuritis, 15 July 1986. The pathology of leprosy neuritis was presented by Dr. S. S. Pandya. Dr. R. Ganapati presented data on neuritis as a clinical and field problem in an urban project. Dr. H. Srinivasan presented his papers on entrapment neuropathy and the role of decompression surgery. Dr. Atul Shah presented work on sensory-motor recovery of function following decompression surgery.

e) The Role of Medical Colleges in Reaching the Goal of Leprosy Eradication, 12 September 1986. Dr. S. K. Noordeen was the resource person. Dr. S. V. Nadkani and Dr. V. R. Mehta spoke on the teaching of leprosy in medical schools. Dr. Gopa Kothari discussed the role of various disciplines in teaching leprosy to medical students. Dr. R. Ganapati commented on the participation of the medical fraternity in the leprosy control program in Bombay. Dr. S. K. Noordeen gave an overview of global leprosy, and discussed recent developments in a candidate leprosy vaccine containing armadillo-derived killed *M. leprae* and BCG.—(From materials received from S. Mass vaccination studies initiated. On 3 February 1987, mass vaccination studies of the Cancer Research Institute (Tata Memorial Centre) antileprosy vaccine were initiated in Jeur village, Akkalokot taluka, Solapur district, Maharashtra State. It is hoped that within the next two to three years approximately 100,000 contacts will be vaccinated and followed for five to seven years. This is the first antileprosy vaccine for which mass vaccination studies have begun in India. Our best wishes go with Dr. M. G. The Netherlands. *Amsterdam will host 1988 International Congress for Tropical Medicine and Malaria.* The XII International Congress for Tropical Medicine and Malaria will be held 18–23 September 1988, in the International Congress Centre RAI, Amsterdam, The Netherlands (immediately following the XIII International Leprosy Congress at The Hague). This modern Congress Centre includes lecture halls, exhibition rooms, lounges and restaurants, and provides outstanding facilities for formal presentation of lectures and posters as well as informal discussions.

The congress site offers efficient public transportation to the city center. Two municipal parks and a railroad station with connections every quarter hour to Amsterdam Airport Schiphol are located within walking distance. Amsterdam itself has much to offer and will fascinate visitors in many respects. The canals, churches and museums are well known and within easy reach of the Congress Centre. Interesting social and cultural activities for delegates and accompanying persons are being arranged, including a reception in the Rijksmuseum.

The Congress will cover the broad field of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene. It will provide a forum for critical review of current knowledge and new findings pertaining to health and problems of health services in the tropics. Topics relevant to the entire field of Tropical Medicine will be discussed in a well-structured way: biomedical, immunological, clinical, epidemiological and public health aspects are to be brought together. The program will include Reviews, Round Tables and Poster Sessions. Reviews will be given on some main topics. Round Tables, organized in advance with invited speakers and participants selected on the

basis of the abstracts submitted, will be used to elaborate on aspects of the main topics. Most individual contributions (free communications) will be in the form of posters. The schedule will allow ample time for viewing posters and for discussions with presenting parties. In addition, Poster-Discussion Sessions will be held. The Congress language will be English.

It is anticipated that the Second Announcement and Call for Free Communications will be sent out in September 1987, with a February 1988 deadline for submission of abstracts. OXFAM-LEPRA: Packs of Teaching-Learning Materials for Leprosy; 1982–1986. In early 1982, following a discussion between representatives of OXFAM and LEPRA (British Leprosy Relief Association) in Oxford, it was decided to assemble a pack of English-language teaching/learning materials for leprosy, mainly as a service of

information and for nursing and paramedical tutors, doctors, and other senior staff with responsibility for teaching. Initially, 25 packs were made up. A few were donated to key institutions and international agencies, but the majority were sold at about £15.00 per pack plus the cost of postage. However, there was an unexpected and continuing demand. During the years 1982 and 1983, 200 packs were assembled and sold to individuals, training centers, control programs and institutions in virtually all the leprosy-endemic areas. In late 1983/early 1984, it was decided to phase out the 20-document pack, largely because of its considerable weight and cost of postage, but also because more appropriate documents had become available. The smaller pack of 10 documents costs £10.00 and contains the following:

A few advance copies were distributed in 1983, 132 in 1984, 200 in 1985, and 207 in 1986. In the period of 1982-1986, over 10,000 documents have thus been distributed from the OXFAM Health Unit in Oxford. Despite limited publicity and adver-

U.S.A. Dr. Paul Brand honored. Dr. Paul W. Brand, F.R.C.S., was honored with the U.S. Surgeon General's Medallion on 12 September 1986 at the Gillis W. Long Hansen's Disease Center, Carville, by Dr. C. Everett Koop, Surgeon General. The award was presented "... for his skill and compassion which have restored and revived the hopes of seriously disabled persons."

Dr. Brand retired from his position as Chief, Rehabilitation Branch at Carville in August with 20 years of government service. He will continue to serve the Center as Senior Consultant.

Leprosy cases for 1986. According to Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Reports from the Centers for Disease Control, there were 254 cases of leprosy reported in 1986. This compares to 352 cases reported for 1985 and a median for the years 1981-1985 of 251. The largest number of new cases were reported from California (118), followed by the Pacific Trust Territories (63), Hawaii (38), Texas (23), and New York City (18).
